This rain-soaked crew fearlessly tackled some overgrown and challenging spots, gladly practicing ecological restoration like it was an extreme sport! They also picked up bags of roadside trash collected by Litter Watch volunteers in support of the Shawnigan

Rotary EcoClub's new adopta-neighbourhood program. An outstanding 837lbs from our area was hauled to Bing's Creek Depot under the #CleanCowichan2021 Tipping Exemption community clean up event permit!

Our Litter Heroes Honours continue with Shawnigan Lake School, who this year went totally "Above and Beyond" their campus to cover an amazing amount of ground over the course of Thursday's Earth Day. Perhaps you saw them ranging eco-purposefully in their bright House shirts? They too did some extreme debris maneuvering! We are so thankful that Fisher Rd Recycling / DL Bins came to the rescue with a bin drop for the junk that had been clogging up and destroying the beauty of the area along Thain Rd. It was truly astounding what the work of 550 students and staff found and removed! The 1240kg of litter for sorting, waste diversion and disposal was generously covered by Spencer Atkinson and team at the Fisher Rd depot with our heartfelt thanks!

EARTH WEEK: Cleaning up the town

Earth Day, one of the world's largest ecological volunteer events, coincides this year with National Volunteer Week in Canada, a combination that has inspired the Shawnigan community to step forward with a week-long series of exciting environmental initiatives both on campus and in the local community.

The theme of this year's National Volunteer Week is "The Value of One, The Power of Many," which highlights the importance of individual actions as well as collective strength. Accordingly, Shawnigan's series of events leading up to Earth Day focused on discussion, awareness and both individual and community action regarding environmental and service initiatives.

Monday saw students compete in an inter-House recycling challenge, a timed event that involved sorting litter into the correct bins. Tuesday's Off-Grid Day encouraged Houses to take on different initiatives to reduce their carbon footprint that day, including going 24 hours without phones, showers and flushing toilets, switching off lights and opting for a vegetarian diet. Teachers also went analogue, taking classes outdoors and forgoing technology for the day. Wednesday's student-led Shawnigan Sustainability Forum allowed those with a



passion for the environment to discuss and prioritise our needs, as a school, in becoming more sustainable. The week then culminated with our campus and community clean-up on Earth Day itself.

Math teacher and event organizer Mark Swannell shares how harnessing the combination of Earth Day and National Volunteer Week has resulted in meaningful action around the School and in the local community: "Students and staff alike have worked together to clean up key areas, not only on campus but also in Shawnigan village and the surrounding area. Our team of Eco-Ninjas worked hard to locate the litter hotspots to make our Earth Day volunteer work the most effective.



Book Review

Hamnet and Judith

by Maggie O'Farrell Published by Alfred A. Knopf Copyright 2020 by Maggie O'Farrell

Opening this book was like entering a long-vanished world. Set in Shakespeare's time, it is a fictional account of his life woven around the few facts we have about the world's most famous writer.

Of course, we know of his plays and that he had three children and a wife, Anne Hathaway, all of whom he left in Stratford-on-Avon while he lived the life of a famous actor and playwright in London.

His son's name was Hamnet, a variation of the name Hamlet, and it is this precious child's death that was thought to inspire the tragedy, "Hamlet."

As we get acquainted with the main characters, we are also drawn into all the smells and sounds of bucolic, rural England. It is, indeed, a believable, rich landscape full of ordinary people working hard to provide food and a living during times that are unimaginable to us.

But there is one thing that is familiar. The Plague enters in and, with it, a sweep of death and destruction taking some,

but not all, seeming to handpick the weakest and most vulnerable.

The main character that emerges is Agnes (Anne), the wife of the Latin Scholar, as Shakespeare is called in this story. She is considered somewhat eccentric, a woman who gathers herbs and has a reputation as a healer. She is both respected and a little feared. She is a watchful and excellent mother.

There is also a jealous mother-in-law, a giant of a supportive brother and a bully of a father-in-law, all adding colour and drama to this novel. The oldest child, Susanna, takes on the role of protective sister to her younger siblings.

Hamnet is a twin, and very close to his sister Judith. When Judith gets the plague, and survives, he somehow manages to catch it from her and dies himself, the beautiful, much-loved child of the family.

The last third of this book is focused on the terrible grief of the mother, Agnes, and that of the rest of the family, all trying desperately to make sense of losing this golden boy. Time passes, and the pain lingers.

Some resolution comes when Agnes, distraught at their growing separation and emotional distance, finally travels to London to see her husband.

The last scene, where she watches the production of "Hamlet" and tries to understand its meaning, is electric. The full realization of her husband's love for his son, and his terrible grief in losing him, floods her being.

And so, along with Agnes and with all the audiences and readers throughout the centuries, we pause to pay tribute to the genius who wrote this most well-known tragedy. Shakespeare, too, knew the meaning of great loss.

Maggie O'Farrell had me spellbound for the whole narrative. This is one of those books where, when you finish, you have to shake your head and wonder where you are, before you step back into the everyday world. Simply brilliant.

Recommended for those who understand about love and grief, and who enjoy imagined stories based on fragments of history.

E.J. Hughes - At Home in Shawnigan

After serving as a War Artist during the Second World War E. J. Hughes and his wife Fern moved to Victoria, but they found the city too noisy. A real estate agent took them to see a property on the east side of Shawnigan Lake, a house and two cottages plus fifty feet of waterfront. Shawnigan Lake Road, which at the time was the Island Highway, ran through the property separating it from the waterfront.


Fern, who suffered from muscular dystrophy, found the walk up to the house arduous and left it to Ed to look the place over. Ever impractical, he didn't notice that the only running water was from a faucet outside by the back door. Keeping the big old house heated would become a challenge, and the heavily treed property required maintenance. But it was scenic, private, affordable – and quiet. On May 27, 1951 they bought it for \$3,500, though it would take them a long time to pay for it.

Hughes' friend Pat Salmon later recalled, "Shawnigan Lake at the time was in the middle of nowhere, so to speak. Hughes didn't have a car. To walk to the village carrying a fifty-inch canvas and then get a bus into Duncan was an onerous hike." Later they bought a little boat which Fern loved driving. Hughes described his pleasure leaning back, his head resting in his clasped hands, eyes closed and feeling the warm Shawnigan breeze blowing across his face. As he said to himself, "this is the life!".

They lived at Shawnigan until 1972. During those years Hughes worked on his paintings six days a week and on Sunday he and Fern walked to The Galley for ice cream. "It was near poverty at times," Salmon concluded, "but it was a simple life, and a very happy life."

Robert Amos has published three books on E. J. Hughes. His recent volume, The E. J. Hughes Book of Boats (TouchWood Editions, 2020) was recently nominated for the BC Book Award. He would be pleased to hear your stories of Hughes and Shawnigan Lake.

Chris Behnsen – Cougar hunter

Christopher George Behnsen, famed sportsman and cougar hunter, lived most of his life at Shawnigan Lake on property that his family bought around 1912. A cigar maker by trade, he took over the management of the family cigar factory, Big-B, in Victoria when his father entered politics in 1903. He then operated a successful trucking business. However, Chris, who craved the outdoor life, gave up his business and became a professional hunter. He became friends with hundreds of hunters and fishermen and his knowledge of the interior of Southern Vancouver Island was rivaled by none. Chris became an expert who was

called upon when authorities needed a marauding cougar treed and killed. In his lifetime he killed more than 150 cougars. The bounty on these animals could be as high as \$30 which was quite a sum in those days.

In the summer, Chris rented boats to fishermen and kept cabins for rent. He gave advice on lures and sweet spots to fish and was considered the authority on the subject. He was also the person lake residents called if repairs were needed on their rowboat so that their boat was in fine form for the following spring.

Chris was the ultimate outdoorsman. He knew the country intimately, could wield an axe or a gun with great skill and it was believed that he could survive under any conditions. Although he was a small, wiry man he could outlast most men, of any age, in the bush – as long as his hounds had the scent he kept going. Neighbours of the Bensen's grew accustomed to the mournful baying of the Chris's cougar hounds and it became as natural in the area as the music of the birds.

Ironically, Chris became a naturalist in his later years and gave up hunting entirely. He was often seen feeding deer, raccoon and mink. He would even comb the fur of squirrels. He was very fond of the animals and would not let anyone harm them. Chris, who was considered part legend while he was alive, died at his home, in 1964, at the age of 83
